The tendency has long been to compartmentalize the study of government institutions on the side of order, system, and routine in politics, to identify them with "politics-as-usual" and look outside of them for the "real" forces of change. But the presidency has never fit this frame very well.... Array the stories of the presidents in succession—each in turn endowed with broad constitutional powers and determined to exercise them in his own right—and the blunt disruptive force of this institution instantly comes to the fore. Together these stories tell of an office that regularly reaches beyond itself to assert control over others, one whose deep-seated impulse to *re*order things routinely jolts order and routine elsewhere, one whose normal activities and operations alter system boundaries and recast political possibilities.
