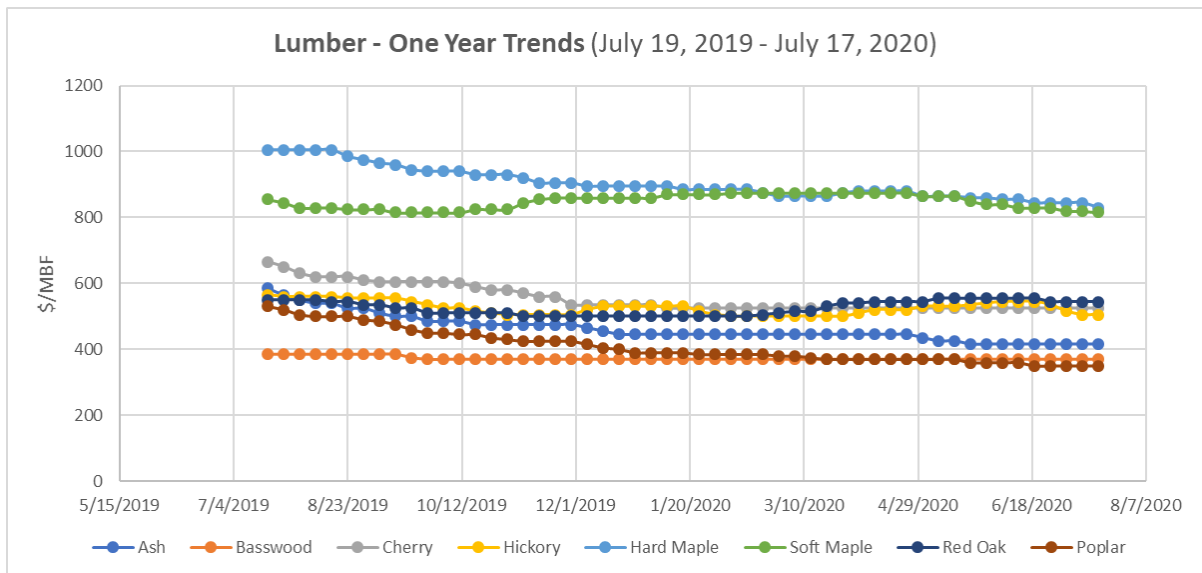

Cross-laminated Timber (CLT) Made from NE Hardwood Gaining Traction

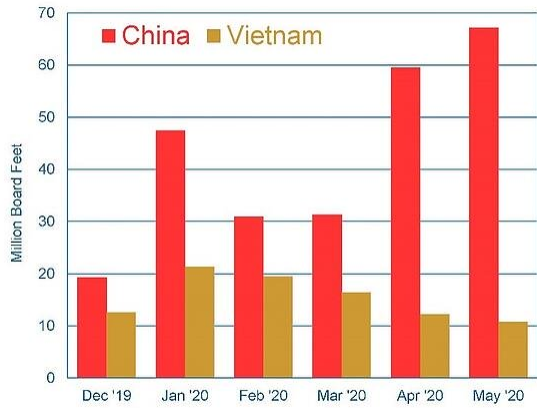
The **New River Train Observation Tower** design-build by Virginia Tech students and faculty sets multiple benchmarks for CLT research, design, and construction globally.

Though facing myriad difficulties stemming from the virus, Vietnam’s economy has a thriving wood processing sector that is heavily dependent on imports of U.S. hardwood lumber.

Additionally, Vietnam’s wood processing industry is poised for long-term growth, post-COVID-19, according to a June report

from the *U.S Foreign Agricultural Service Global Agricultural Information Network (GAIN)*.
