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Aristotle Research Seminar

OUR PROJECT

Funded by the LSU <u>Center for Collaborative Knowledge</u>, the Aristotle Research Seminar is composed of select faculty and graduate students undertaking to study Aristotle's influence on, and acceptance or rejection by, modern science. We began in academic year 2019-20 studying seven of Aristotle's texts that were foundational to as many disciplines, under one another's guidance. In 2020-21 we read Aristotle's *De Anima* (On the Soul) and then turn to a study of Darwin's *Origin of Species* for contrast. In 2021-22 we will read Darwin's *Descent of Man* and Aristotle's *Nicomachean Ethics*. Participants agree to read the selections beforehand, with presenters charged to begin and facilitate discussion rather than to lecture at length. We will meet six times during the year, as indicated in the margin.
